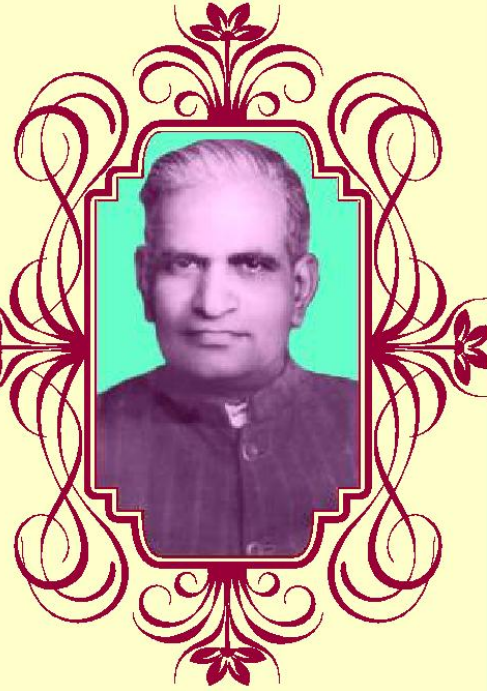

1.1 ENLIGHTEN TO ABOLISH DARKNESS

1.1.1 State the vision, mission and objectives of the institution, and describe how these are communicated to the students, teachers, Staff and other stakeholders.

Kabli Mal Ramji Das Jain College for Women, Malerkotla, was established in July 1971 and affiliated to Punjabi University in July 1981 with a mission to educate girls. Malerkotla being Muslim populated city, burqa clad girls were not allowed to read or write. They were confined to the four walls of their house. The founders of the college felt that girls' education means the real upliftment of society. Woman human resource is the best resource of the society. The visionary founders started with degree course in humanities and they went on changing and progressing with the passage of time. To meet the demands of the society, they introduced PGDCA, MSC (IT), BCA, B.Com, M.A. Hindi, M.A. Punjabi, M.A. English and M.Com. this very year. They have also added six add on courses for all round personality development of pupils. It also aims to provide the students basic skills for their career enhancement and personal lives. Moral values and activities are also inculcated in the students. N.S.S, Red Cross, Red Ribbon Club, Legal Literacy Club, Youth Activities, Sports etc. are to assist students in their social, vocational & academic pursuits.

1.1.2 How does the institution develop and deploy action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum? Give details of the process and Substantiate through specific examples(s).

The curriculum development process is determined by the University. We enrich our curriculum with the feedback from the various concerned groups. As staff members are the members of board of studies or faculty of languages etc. The meetings are attended by the staff and their contribution is there. Before going to these meetings, feedback is received from the students at regular intervals as well as academic experts, industry professionals etc. The faculty interacts with different classes and even the worthy Principal interacts with the toppers of each course. She guides the teachers and allows them to attend the meetings of the Board of Studies & Faculty of Languages. Even the worthy Principal herself is the member of Academic Council.

1.1.3 What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (From the University and /or institution) for effectively translating the Curriculum and improving teaching practices?

So far as curriculum is concerned, teachers if find any difficulty or problem, make contacts with Board of studies. Sometimes, before going to attend the meeting of Board of studies or Faculty of languages, members from the college discuss the problems or difficulties with their own staff members as well as surrounding colleges. College is always there to support them in any way.

Institution conducts Seminars, Workshops in which the eminent scholars, academicians from concerned field are invited. Even the staff members are allowed to participate in workshops, seminars & conferences etc.

Faculty members, who go for workshops seminars and meetings of Board of Studies and Faculty Meetings, get feedback from Staff & Students. Further so far as industry is concerned Commerce Department and Computer Department keep in touch with them.

The institution provides facilities to the staff members to attend the meetings of the Board of Studies, Faculty of Languages & Faculty of Different Departments. Before attending the meetings staff gets feedback not only from its own staff members but also from surrounding colleges.

The Institution takes class tests both written and verbal, House tests and Assignments; conducts seminars of the Students to ensure stated objectives of curriculum. If any discrepancy is found, extra attention and time is paid to the weak students.

1.2 ACADEMIC FLEXIBILITY

1.2.1 Specifying the goals and objectives give details of the certificate/diploma/Skill development courses etc., offered by the institution.

With the objective of providing education in various fields to keep win the ever evolution economic, social & technological spheres of the world, College is offering courses in Humanities, Commerce, & Computer Science both at UG and PG level. There is wide range of elective subjects at UG level in Humanities.

Core /Elective subjects are provided in UG Humanities Programmes where students have to opt three subjects as per policy of Punjabi University, Patiala along with two compulsory subjects. In B.A. we are offering 14 elective subjects including Urdu literature which is very rare in Punjab. There are also six Add on courses for B.A. and B.Com. students of three levels; Certificate, Diploma & Advance Diploma level to enhance their vocational skills.

Yes, College allows twinning programmes. There are six Add-on Courses, certificate, Diploma & Advance Diploma Courses which Students can do while doing their main course study at undergraduate level. B.A. and B.Com. Students can opt any of the Course.

1. Range of core Option for B.A. is 14.College is offering 14 optional subjects, out of which students have to opt any three subjects. College is also offering add on Courses for Skill Development to B.A. and B.Com. Students.
2. Choice based Credit System has been introduced by Punjabi University, Patiala for M.A. classes from the Session 2014-15.
3. College offers different modules in B.A. English Literature, Hindi Literature and Sanskrit Literature etc.
4. College has the provision of lateral entry like M.Sc. IT (Lateral Entry) where students can seek admission into M.Sc. (IT) second year after completing one year study under the course of Post Graduate Diploma in Computer Application (P.G.D.C.A.) or equivalent course. Every student is given the option of changing the stream within the given period. In B.A. course students are allowed to change their elective subjects in fifteen days. Students are allowed to change their one subject in II year of their degree course on the condition that they will have to qualify 1st year exam of the opted subject but the subject should not a Practical Subject as per Punjabi University, Patiala rules.
5. College provides Add on Courses in form of Enrichment Courses.
 - Cosmetology
 - Spoken English for Communication Skills
 - Data Care Management
 - Fashion Designing
 - Interior Decoration
 - Early childhood care and Education. These are introduced for the enrichment of Skills with the main Course of B.A. / B.Com. students These courses are provided at three levels i.e. Certificate course, Diploma course, Advance Diploma course.

1.2.4 Does the institution offer self-financed programmes? If ‘yes’, list them and indicate how they differ from other programmes, with reference to admission, curriculum, fee structure, teacher qualification, salary etc.

Yes, keeping in view the demands of students & Society, College has introduced following different self financing courses in the college:

- M.A. HINDI, PBI., ENG.
- M.Com.

These programs are at par with the aided programs. The policies regarding admission are adopted as per Punjabi University rules & regulations. Qualification of the staff is fixed as per U.G.C./Punjab Government guidelines.

Yes, College provides (six add on courses) skill oriented programmes relevant to regional and global employment markets. Early childhood care and Education, Spoken English & Data Care Management etc. are very helpful for globalization of students.

College was established to provide quality education to the girls of this backward area. Malerkotla is Muslim populated area. Girls were compelled to wear burqas and they were not allowed to acquire any education. So the founders of the Institution decided to establish this college for the education of girls of under privileged sections of society. The basic goal of the college is to provide educational opportunities that emphasize skills and through a life time of social and technological changes. The founders of the college recognized that education plays an important role in developing skills which are needed for a productive society and essential in promoting the individual’s sense of worth, value and high ethical standards. The college is committed to educate girls to establish a healthy society and discover leadership qualities in them.

With this idea college offers wide range of options in U.G. program. It is also offering and adding new courses as per demands of the time.

1.3.2 What are the efforts made by the institution to enrich and organize the Curriculum to enhance the experiences of the students so as to cope with the needs of dynamic employment market?

The college organizes Extensions Lectures, Educational Trips & Tours, students are awakened through N.S.S., Red Cross, Red Ribbon Club and Youth Activities to the needs of the society. They get chances to interact with the pupils of different colleges and develop educational skills.

The college has organized Legal Literacy Club to awaken the girls about their legal human rights. The lectures on Environmental Education & Human Rights are also delivered by eminent scholars.

The College is dedicated to the holistic development of students. So different programmes, lectures are conducted for the development of students, better career options and employable & life skills

1. Different festival days, birth days & contributions of eminent scholars are celebrated e.g. Swami Vivekanand's birthday, Guru Nanak Dev birthday, Communal Harmony day, Eid, Rakhi and Women's Day etc.
2. Add on courses have been introduced for the employability and life skills. Courses like Cosmetology, Early childhood care and Education, Spoken English for Communication skills, Fashion Designing etc. These courses were introduced with an idea that girls can run their own Business while performing their domestic duties.
3. The Institution recognizes the needs of the time and introduces new courses. The college was established only with B.A. Now it is running B.A., B.C.A., B.Com, M.Sc. (IT), M.Sc. (IT), (Lateral Entry), P.G.D.C.A, M.As (English, Punjabi, and Hindi) & M.Com.
4. N.S.S., Red Cross, Red Ribbon Club etc. are community oriented programs Even Legal Literacy Club also organizes Programme for the awareness of women & offers them help to fight against injustice.

1.3.5 Citing a few examples enumerate on the extent of use of the feedback from stakeholders in enriching the curriculum?

Feedback is achieved from the students and their parents through the alumni &PTA meetings. Even the teaching staff themselves gets the feedback from the students in the class room.

Students are given Assignments and Seminars, Class Test, House Test to evaluate the quality of its enrichment programmes. Extension Lectures etc. are also conducted.

Relevance of course contents are discussed in the alumni meetings and suggestions are considered while revising the course curriculum. 2.1 STUDENT ENROLLMENT AND PROFILE

2.1.1 How does the college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

Admission Process: - the college faculty visits different schools, surrounding villages to enlighten the students and their parents regarding the courses taught in the college. A bird's eye view of campus and infrastructure is shown in the prospectus which the teaching staff carries with them. Afterwards arrangements are made for the students to visit college and see themselves for the courses and infrastructure; students who fulfill the basic eligibility are given admission. Government College is there in Malerkotla where girls' education is free. So students who are allowed to go there get admission there. The best publicity is made by the alumni and present students by the medium of mouth to mouth. Besides this wide publicity and transparency is ensured in the admission process

1. The College prospectus is updated every year. It provides detailed information regarding courses, eligibility conditions and infrastructure of the College.
2. The College has an informative website to guide & provide useful information to the public.
3. Pamphlets & flairs are distributed.
4. Our results are also medium of publicity.

The College offers courses in UG, PG & PG diploma. Admission committees are formed & published in the prospectus to facilitate the students. These committees monitor the admissions. They also provide Counseling to the students for their best courses. Admission is made according to the interest and aptitude of the students. The minimum eligibility for all PG courses as per Punjabi University, Patiala eligibility criteria. In UG classes students too are given admission as per the eligibility criteria of Punjabi University, Patiala and on the basis of academic records & personal interviews with the admission committee.

In UG classes students are given admission on the basis of eligibility as specified by Punjabi University, Patiala. For PG classes minimum eligibility is 50% in graduation of any stream as per Punjabi University, Patiala rules.

The senior faculty members review the profile of the students. If they find that the demand for any subject/course has increased; changes are made in the selection of the students.

1. **Women:** - The College was established with mission to educate girls so every possible effort is made to promote women education.
2. **SC /OBC /Minority:** -SC students are given full fee concession and scholarship as per Govt. rules. Even OBC & minority community are given scholarships as per Punjab Govt. Policy. College is a secular one. Though it is named Jain College and is run by the Jain community, there is no discrimination of color, caste or creed. Minority community also gets scholarships from Central/State govt.
3. **Economically Weaker section:** -College extends support to economically & socially backward students by giving them fee concession and free books from the Book Bank for the whole academic session. Some teachers bear the fee of economically weaker students. Retired Punjab & Haryana High Court Judge Mr. Gian Chand Aggarwal adopts 2 students for full fee every year. LIC also provides scholarship to weaker sections under LIC Golden Jubilee Scholarship scheme Sri Rakesh Jain Advocate donates 11000 /- per year for two students.

- College also gives the facility of paying fees in installments which is also a healthy Practice for economically weaker students who are unable to pay the whole amount in one installment.
 - Financial Assistance is also given from the Poor students Relief Fund which is supported by the faculty.
 - Toppers are given special Concession in fee. Roll of Honor & College Color is awarded to outstanding students. Sports girls are given special attention and many facilities & preference is given to them in admission.
 - Sanskrit students are awarded scholarships given by Bhartiya Rashtriya Sansthan.
 - Tapa Bradari & Aggarwal Sabha also help the economically weaker students.
 - Even Students get Merit Scholarship from Punjabi University, Patiala.
4. **Differently Abled:** -Differently abled students are provided all the facilities required by them as per their need.
5. Students are encouraged to participate in extra co-curricular activities.

2.2 CATERING TO STUDENT DIVERSITY

2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

The College is well aware of the requirements of differently abled students. We have very negligible number of differently abled students. But whenever there is any such student, the Institution caters to her needs as per requirement.

2.2.2. Does the institution assess the student's needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the Programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.

The admission committee by making analysis of marks sheet of students at entry point identifies slow and advanced learners. The institution is well aware of the needs of students. The college is like a ladder which can help them to climb up the world of their dreams. Every class contains mixture of intelligent, average and slow students. We admit students of all calibers on tune with our objective "Education for All." In order to satisfy their queries, the College ensures the readiness of teachers to answer their doubts.

The students are awakened regarding the Examination marking pattern in the interactive session on the very first day of their academic session. The principal of the college addresses the students and motivates & guides them regarding their studies and different activities of the college. The convener of discipline committee guides the students regarding college discipline rules. College House exam controller awakens students about house exam rules and youth coordinator about youth activities of the college. The Physical Education teacher motivates students to participate in games. In nutshell students are made aware of all the activities, rules & regulations of the college.

Even the subject teachers acquaint the students with their course and its pattern, examination and marking pattern on the very first day of their class. Tutorials are organized for the students to get feedback and remove their problems and grievances.

The UG students can change their course within the given period; change their subject within fifteen days. Even they can change their one elective subject in 2nd year but they have to appear in 1st year exam of the opted subject.

The subject teacher assesses the students by personal contacts in the classes and identifies the problems of slow learners as well as the need of advance learners to acquire latest knowledge and guides them properly. If she finds any guidance for anything is required from the Principal and the Management, she goes to them and gets her purpose solved.

2.2.3 What are the strategies adopted by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of enrolled students (Bridge/Remedial/Add-on/Enrichment Courses etc.) to enable them to cope with the Programme of their choice?

These are the strategies drawn and deployed by the institution:-

1. The students who require additional knowledge in any subject are given special Lectures.
2. Remedial classes are arranged for weaker students.
3. Extension lectures, seminars etc. are arranged to bridge the knowledge gap of enrolled students and enable them to cope up with the Programme of their choice. They are motivated for an innovative and creative mindset. Even teachers pay attention to weak learners. They are counseled and motivated by the teacher.
4. The College is running six Add-on-courses for skill development.
 - Spoken English for communication skills
 - Cosmetology
 - Interior Decoration
 - Fashion Designing
 - Early Childhood Care and Education
 - Data Care Management

2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

The college has the tradition of holistic approach to education with emphasis on moral and ethical values. The college sensitizes its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc. by holding seminars on relevant topics like Women Empowerment, Female Foeticide etc. Celebration of Women's Day is also a part of the same tradition. The college has NSS unit approved by the Punjabi University and offers various community services and environment issues to enlighten students. Environment Education is a compulsory subject for

students in which awakening regarding environment and planting of trees is emphasized. Students are awakened to Save Water, Electricity also.

2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

The advanced learners are identified with the help of information related to academic and extracurricular activities. Further advanced learners are detected by the teachers in their classrooms by their participation in class room, with their problems brought to teacher, class test, verbal or written. Their active participation in seminars and interest in reading extra books show their learning aptitude. Learning process within the classroom shows their ambience and teachers play a significant role in creating such an ambience. Various methods are adopted by the teachers to assess the students such as through presence of mind in class, vocal responses and performance in class test, House / Final Examinations etc. They are supported in the best possible manner by the teachers. Teachers pay special attention to students with extra work, references & guidance. They are provided with the additional time, advance learning material. They are also motivated for better career options; motivational books and lectures are also organized to channelize their potential to better results. Students are motivated with special Prizes by the college. Even Roll of Honor and College Colors are awarded to deserving students for encouragement and motivation to other students too.

They are also encouraged to participate in different competitions written or oral. They are provided opportunities to participate in various competitions. This Year a PG student Rimsha who had never went to stage was given chance to participate in youth festival and scored 1st position in poetical recitation at zonal level. Even she was honored by the alumni of old students. She scored 75% marks in first year of PG (Hindi). Such students are motivated in every possible way. The creative ability of students is given vent through wall magazines; newsletter and college magazine. A friendly atmosphere is created to improve the communication skills of the Learner.

2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the Programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker Sections etc. who may discontinue their studies if some sort of support is not provided)?

The college collects and analyzes the data with regard to academic history, attendance record, developing a mechanism to inculcate academic tastes among the students by way of organizing classroom seminars, debates, quiz programs, conducting tests, assigning project works, classroom and laboratory involvement, arranging remedial classes and extension lectures. Academic performance of the slow learners, economically weaker sections etc. is

detected by the teachers during their lectures in classrooms. We use marks as index for identifying. Slow learner students are subjected to various methods of evaluation, vocal responses, sample individual responses & written test after each unit of syllabus. Those students who do not seem to be coping with the pace of learning are advised and counseled by teachers by assisting them in their study material. They are specially advised and counseled to improve themselves. Based on their performance, students are identified as slow and advanced learners. The morale of the slow learner is boosted by counseling sessions, remedial classes and providing additional learning material such as text books and previous question papers from University exams. Every possible assistance is given to the slow learners. Even teachers pay special attention by remedial coaching, extra classes etc. College provides special attention to physically handicapped students also. Even while allotting class rooms, their needs are kept in mind. Teachers help them in every possible way and students are also advised to be considerate, sympathetic and affectionate towards such students. They are encouraged to apply for scholarships and jobs of their interests. They are given preference at the time of admission. The college strictly follows Punjabi University rules & regulations. Scholarships & fee concessions are also given to the economically weak students. Free books are also given from book bank for the complete session.

2.3 TEACHING LEARNING PROCESS

2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print etc.)

The college plans to mention the commencing of teaching classes, house test and University exams in the prospectus. Teachers plan their syllabus and more than 70% syllabus is covered before house test. Teachers themselves assign seminars and assignments. Teachers inform students well in advance. Class tests, verbal & written are also conducted by the teachers. Teaching, learning and evaluation schedule is monitored by the Principal.

2.3.2 How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structure and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

Learning is a lifelong process. Generally lecture method is adopted and supplemented by the discussions, interactive sessions, presentations and use of teaching aid. Fully equipped labs are available in Home Science, Physical Education, Music and Computer. Even English functional lab is also there for spoken English, where advanced software is used for the communication skills. Computer department uses advanced software for students. Seminars, Assignments, presentations, notes and reference books are also given. Projector, transparencies are also used when necessary.

2.3.3 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

Education is student centric. We recognize the advance learners and slow learners. Then teacher makes a balance in the class. Verbal revisions of previous lecture are there before starting the new lessons. Seminars, assignments, group discussions and class debates are also promoted by the teachers. Teachers pay special attention to slow learners and advance learners. Advance learners are given extra work and for slow learners chapters are made easy. Even students are made to participate in class seminars to develop their communication skills. College Magazines nurtures critical thinking and creativity among the students.

2.3.4 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?

There is an integral relation between chalk & blackboard in educational activities. But latest technologies are also used for making teaching, learning, interesting and effective. Even PowerPoint presentations are being used by the teachers. College caters internet facility to staff & students. Faculty members are exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills through refresher courses and general orientation courses.

Tutorial groups have been made for personal & psycho-socio guidance. Each teacher has 10 to 15 students. She serves as advisor, guide & monitor to students. The career guidance cell provides career guidance to students.

White boards have replaced blackboard. Teachers and students are protected from respiratory and vasal diseases which are caused by the use of chalk on blackboard. Power-point technology is being used by some teachers these days which makes studies both interesting and more grasping.

2.3.7 How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

Library plays an important role in any institution. It is an integral part of college. We have an enriched library. It is full of Course Books, Journals, Magazines, Newspapers, Books on literature, Social Science & G.K. Some competition books are also there to help teachers and students. Students are advised to visit library daily in their free period and read Newspapers, Magazines etc. They (Especially PG students) are also advised to consult reference books and have extensive knowledge of the subjects they are reading. Library is being computerized which will be operative from the session 2016-17.

2.3.8 Does the institution face any challenge in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If yes, elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

The curriculum is well planned and teachers make their planning to complete it within given time period. Approximately 70% syllabus is completed before house test. If they find any problem, extra classes are engaged and remedial classes for weak students. Efforts never go in vain. Teachers are always at the service of students. Even P.G students are given phone numbers to contact teachers at any time. Teachers are devoted and dedicated to their duty.

2.3.9 How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?

Students and results are the best methods to evaluate teachers. College has developed a mechanism for evaluation of teachers. Our principal & management give preference to students. The college has put up suggestion box near Principal Office. This box is checked by the Principal herself. She interacts with the students directly. Students have direct access to the Principal. They can approach her directly without any hesitation. The pass outs have to fill feedback Performas. These feedbacks Performas are duly evaluated by the committee and suggestions are considered. Teachers are informed about their evaluation by the principal. Even tutorial meetings are held to get feedback from the students. They can share their problems and problems are discussed with the Principal. The necessary action is taken. Record of students' performance in house tests is properly maintained.

The college ensures that the students should be well aware of examination system. They are introduced to the examination process in Prospectus, then in the inaugural function, and teachers inform them about the process on the very first day, when they discuss their syllabus. Stakeholders are made well aware about the Examination process.

The University puts factitious Roll numbers to the answer sheets. OMR sheets & signature sheets are also introduced to the students. Teachers are instructed to set and mark their papers as per university pattern.

The institution is very much conscious about the evaluation so that the students may score well in the finals. Class tests, verbal or written, and tutorials are integral part of this. Teachers write down their comments on the question paper to guide the students. The teachers

guide the students to avoid mistakes and score well. Seminars, Assignments, Projects are given to the students for their improvement.

Twenty five percent marks have been assigned for internal assessment in all classes except B.A.III now. These marks are divided among seminar, Assignments, class test, class attendance & house test. Students are motivated to participate actively in these. So they are awarded good marks as per their above said performance.

There is a lot of progression among the students, from entry level to exit level. They grow confident and a lot of behavioral changes are found in them. They progress continuously in their studies. Such examples can be found in each & every course & class.

University certifies syllabus & examination pattern data etc. for the examination. College adheres to the university norms. Students are intimated about their examination dates, results etc. on the notice board as well as on college website. Even the students are advised to check university website too.

College is always at the service of students. Students are well aware about OMR sheets, signature sheets, invigilation, flying squads and datasheets to be present in the examination hall in time. The House test is conducted purely on the basis of University pattern. Students are prepared for final exams in the house tests. Even the question papers are also set as per university pattern. If they have any grievance at university level, even then college is at their service e.g. If the question paper is out of syllabus or result is late, College takes all the responsibility for the students and does all the needful work for them.

2.6 STUDENT PERFORMANCE AND LEARNING OUTCOMES

2.6.1 Does the college have clearly stated learning outcomes/ If 'yes' give details on how the students and staff are made aware of these?

Students and staff are made aware that there will be House tests, Class tests, seminars, Assignments, assessment, theory, practical. Each & every detail is told to the students in their introductory session. Even the teachers discuss the pattern of exams with the students before starting their syllabus. Question paper style is also discussed. Staff & students are made aware of learning outcomes of university through the website. College notifies it on notice board for students & it is circulated to the staff. Proper record is maintained in result registers. Even subject wise score is also notified. Concerned teachers check the marks of their students & motivate the students. Wherever they find the need of remedial classes, they arrange it.

Class tests are given to the students with marks and remarks, so that they may improve themselves. College highlights their achievements & Roll of Honor is given to the University position holder. Miss Liza was placed in university in BAIII She was awarded Roll of Honor. Here it is noteworthy that one student of MA Hindi Miss Rimsha has scored I position in University scoring 1222/1600 in 2014-15 and has won Gold Medal. In M.A. Punjabi. Miss Shabnam was placed in University merit list at 6th position in May 2014. Miss Shabnam and, Miss Harjot kaur have cleared UGC Net (Pbi) in Dec. 2014. It is their remarkable achievement. These students are specially honored by the institution. Our management feels honored by Honoring such students. Even worthy VC of Punjabi University presented Gold Medal to Miss Liza in our own college, when he was presiding over annual function.

Ours is a developing college. It is situated in a backward area of Sangrur district. It is populated by girls. But with the services of the college, girls have got opportunity to study. Now the pass outs of this college have become mothers and they came with the suggestion of higher education because still parents don't allow girls to send out of Malerkotla. That is why the institution has started P. G. classes in all streams. It started PGDCA in 2006, M.Sc. (I.T.) in 2009, M.A. (Hindi) in 2011, M.A. (English) in 2012, M.A. (Punjabi) in 2012, and M.Com in July 2015.

Time will come when there will be a research center for students and teachers. But it is good for the institution that the staff is pursuing research work. Mrs. Disha (English), Mrs. Manpreet Kaur (Punjabi), Mrs. Harjinder Kaur (Psychology) are pursuing their PhDs.

- Time is not far away when many new teachers will go for their Ph.D. New projects will be taken by teachers. A research center will be established in the future.

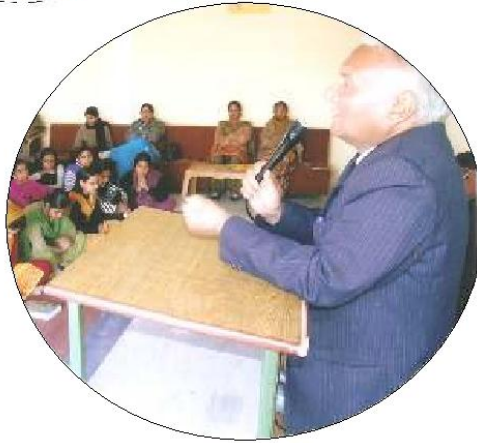

4.1 PHYSICAL FACILITIES

4.1.1 What is the policy of the institution for creation and enhancement of infrastructure that facilitate effective teaching and learning?

The college has a campus with 2987 sq. mts. area centrally located well in the heart of the city and it provides the safe, congenial and conducive atmosphere for the dynamic education of the girls in this minority dominated town. The college has purchased 5.5 Bigah land for Playground in 2015-16

- The central library in the college caters well to the reference needs of the staff and students. The college has a well stocked library with books on different subjects, journals, periodicals and a number of daily newspapers in English, Hindi and Punjabi. There is facility of Book bank too for providing free books to the needy, economically weaker students.
- There are 35 spacious, airy classrooms and one hall for recreational activities. College provides facility of common room, washrooms, canteen and gym as well.

4.1.2 Detail the facilities available for

- 1. Curricular and Co-Curricular activities-classrooms, technology enabled learning spaces, seminar halls, tutorial spaces, laboratories, botanical garden, Animal house specialized facilities and equipment for teaching, learning and research etc.**
- 2. Extra-curricular activities-sports, outdoor and indoor games, gymnasium, auditorium, NSS, NCC, cultural activities, Public speaking, Communication skill development, Yoga, Health and hygiene etc.**

The college has 4 computer labs, including UGC Network resource Centre, which have 53 Computers with latest configuration connected to Internet via Wi-Fi Router.

All the computer labs and administrative block have Wi-Fi connectivity. The facility of Photocopier is also there in the administrative block.

- Digital language laboratory was established in 2005 with 15 Speakers for enhancing communication skills in students
- The college has well equipped music room, Home Science, fashion designing, Cosmetology, Psychology Labs with latest equipments to carry out practical work.
- The college has 2 power generators to ensure uninterrupted power supply.

- College has an air conditioned seminar hall with seating capacity of about 200 persons. It is equipped with latest audio visual equipment.

Infrastructure for sports

- College offers sports facilities for various indoor games like Table Tennis, Ball Badminton, Chess, Taekwondo, Judo and Karate. The college has a Play Ground too having 5.5 Bighas of area.
- College has a Gym for maintaining fitness of girls as well as teachers.

NSS

- College has 1.5 NSS unit with enrollment of about 150 volunteers every year.

Transport Facility

College has one mini bus and 4 vans which offer subsidized transport facilities to the students from nearby villages.

4.1.3 How does the institution plan and ensure that the available infrastructure is in line with its academic growth and is optimally utilized? Give specific examples of the facilities developed/augmented and the amount spent during the last four years (Enclose the master plan of the institution/ campus and indicate the existing physical infrastructure and the future planned expansion if any).

Optimal utilization of College infrastructure

- Library of the college is open throughout the year even during vacations.
- Wi-Fi facility is available for students as well as teachers in all the labs.
- Local administration utilizes college hall for organizing various events like Voters Day, Save Girl Child Day, Yoga day and lectures on various issues like awareness about Traffic rules etc.
- College infrastructure is also used by the office of Election Commission for setting up Election Booths.
- College infrastructure is used to set up booth for enrollment of new voters.
- Various NGOs like Bharat Vikas Parishad, Hindi Sahitya Sabha, Manav Nishkam Sewa & Punar Netra Jot etc. organize various seminars and competitions in college campus. Various camps like Blood Donation, Eye Check up, Medical Checkup etc. are also organized by these NGOs in the college campus. College provides infrastructure for meetings and medical camps etc. are held here by chemist association, Jain Sabha etc.

4.1.4 How does the Institution ensures that the infrastructure facilities meet the requirements of students with physical disabilities?

Needs of disabled staff and students are always taken into account and necessary support is always provided, whenever needed e.g. during examination days any such examinee is provided seat at the ground floor. Ramps have also been constructed for their convenience.

College caters to the needs of day scholars only. There is no provision of Residential facility.

4.1.6. What are the provisions made available to students and staff in terms of health care on the campus and off the campus?

- Services of local Civil Hospital are made available to staff and students in case of any emergency. The effected person is immediately taken to Civil Hospital and her parents are informed. Some time even a physician is called in the college if need arises during examination days.
- A team of three teachers is there to provide first aid, if ever needed on the campus.

4.1.7 Give details of the common facilities available on the campus-spaces for special units like IQAC, Grievance Redressal unit, Women's Cell, Counseling and Career Guidance, Placement Unit, Health Centre, Canteen, Recreational spaces for staff and students, safe drinking water facility, auditorium etc.

College has made provision for student canteen comprising of a kitchen and two dining halls. The college canteen is spacious, equipped with good furniture, well maintained, hygienic serving variety of food items available at reasonable price. The college tries its best to provide all the basic amenities like safe drinking water and wash rooms. It has 3 water coolers

connected with Aqua guard Purifiers, separate washrooms at each floor for staff and students. IQAC, Grievance Redressal Committee, Anti Ragging Committee, Legal Literacy Cell, Career and Counseling cell have been formed. However, hardly any grievance regarding any such issue has been reported as college provides quite conducive and secure atmosphere for girls. There is no separate health center established but there is provision for providing first aid in case of any minor injuries. Otherwise services of local Civil Hospital are utilized in case of any emergency to staff and students. For recreational activities there is provision of one hall and the compact compound with a big stage in it.

Recent initiatives to enhance infrastructure

The college has a plan for enhancement of infrastructure in order to promote a good teaching, learning environment. Some of the recent initiatives in this direction are

- A playground with 5.5 Bighas of area has been purchased in 2015-16.
- There is provision to add 4 new classrooms during the current session i.e. 2015-16 for which construction has been started.
- Library is being digitized i.e. from current session 2015-16 and will be operative from Session 2016-17.

The library is considered the heart of the college and is a source of fulfilling the mission of the college i.e. providing the youth education that emphasizes skills and knowledge that will help them to adjust through a life time of social and technological changes. This all is possible under the able Advisory Committee comprising the Principal, Librarian and three senior teachers.

Now Mr. Puneet Sapra, Asst. Prof. in Computer Science has been given the charge along with Mrs. Renu Bala. Seminars and lectures are held to make students aware of the opportunities.(Detail given below) Most of the undergraduates opt. for higher studies. About 80%students go to higher studies either P.G. or B.Ed. A few options for other courses like Banking, CA, Law etc. Most of the girls prefer teaching profession. Hence after doing PG or B.Ed. they are absorbed as teachers in schools or colleges. There are no campus placements but, it is worth mentioning here that pass outs from our college can be found teaching in each and every school /college of the city or its surrounding areas. More than 50% students after doing PG from our college have jobs.

6.1 INSTITUTIONAL VISION AND LEADERSHIP

6.1.1 State the vision and mission of the Institution and enumerate on how the mission statement defines the institution's distinctive characteristics in terms of addressing the needs of the society, the student it seeks to serve, institution's traditions and value orientations, vision for the future, etc.?

Malerkotla being backward & mostly Muslim populated city, girls were mostly confined to the four walls of the house. They were not allowed to read & write. The visionaries of the college felt the need for the development of the girls. As we know that the girls contribute a lot in the development of society. Japanese generally say that “Give us good mothers, we’ll give you good nation”. We strive for value oriented education to the girls to make them enlightened citizens of the nation.

Mission – We serve the cause of education to the students from diverse backgrounds. An erudite & competent staff strives to equip students with higher education as well as make them good citizens of the universe. We try to make them analytical, unprejudiced and competitive citizens of the society. We try to make them such individuals who can make heaven out of hell for space others.

Objective- To make this world a peace-loving place- as Malerkotla caters to diversity. There is unity in diversity.

- Holistic Approach among the students.
- To reach the less-privileged of the society.
- To make girls self dependent.
- To focus on personality development through Positive Approach, Leadership Qualities and self awareness.

The vision and mission of the college is for the betterment of the society. Most of the students are coming from rural areas and backward areas. So college has made education accessible to those who were deprived of it. It is changing & adding new streams and new subjects on the demand of the society and students. College translates its vision with its activities by-

- By establishing a number of Cells & Committees to deliberate on quality related issues pertaining to higher education.
- By providing vibrant atmosphere conducive to all round development of students.
- By undertaking capacity building initiatives.

College is committed to holistic education of the students to make them empowered leaders of the future. The college is dedicated to Nationalistic Causes, Commitment to social causes of integrity & unity among masses and Service before self in all academic & administrative

affairs are the Slogans of College . Education is pro women as it is purely Girls College. They are given basic qualities to adjust in life & be useful citizens of the society. College administration supports faculty in updating themselves, as a teacher is a learner throughout her life who burns herself to illuminate others.

6.1.2 What is the role of top management, Principal and Faculty in design and implementation of its quality policy and plans?

College is run by Kabli Mal, Ramji Das Jain Trust Society. It has its own constitution. It follows it in toto but also changes as the time requires. It has a dynamic Managing Committee which is dedicated to education. The Director of Committee is Mr. D. D. Bhatti who is National Awardee. Managing Committee all the time promotes staff and students. They extend their helping hand. Secondly it is affiliated to Punjabi University, Patiala. Staff members are the members of Board of Studies and Faculty of Languages. They play a great role in the making of syllabus. When new courses are added sometimes our teachers play pivotal role in framing the syllabus and other important information.

Md. Principal herself is very dynamic. She attends all the meetings of University. Principal & staff discuss the problems of the students and play their positive role in academics.

College is aided by the Punjab Government under 95% grant-in-aid. So the college follows the directions of DPI (Colleges), Punjab. Md. Principal is always in touch with the DPI regarding Punjab Government rules & regulations. So, all the instructions are followed and new suggestions are conveyed to the Government through DPI Punjab. She is responsible for all the correspondence with the DPI, Punjab.

Md. Principal has cordial relations with students. Students can approach her easily. They can go to her with their problems.

Md. Principal receives reports from the different committees of the college and guides them with her valuable advice.

A list of infrastructure requirements from Departments is sent to the Principal. She scrutinizes it and recommends to the Management.

Being the Head of the institution, her role is multi-dimensional. She is responsible for the academic & administrative functioning of the college. So, she prepares agenda for the session and places it before the staff & gets her plans executed by the staff.

She is responsible for all the correspondence with University Grants Commission which is central funding body. College is getting huge grants from U.G.C. for its development. She is always anxious about new plans of U.G.C. and getting maximum help from it. She performs her duty very efficiently.

The college has constituted different committees with teaching & non-teaching staff which plays an important role in the planning and implementation of activities in different spheres of institutional functioning. The Principal gets suggestions and report from different committees of the college for improvement in its functioning.

The personal interaction of the Principal with various stakeholders, the faculty, the non-teaching staff, students & parents play an important role in this. Apart from this, feedback Proformas & Self Appraisal Proformas of the teachers, help the Principal and Management to plan for further policies.

This participatory role of the staff encompasses & sustains the involvement of the other staff which is necessary for the efficient & effective running of the college.

6.1.3 The involvement of leadership in ensuring the policy statements and action plans for fulfillment of the stated mission, Interaction with stakeholders, reinforcing the culture of excellence.

The DPI colleges & Punjabi University Patiala enlightens the Principal, who in turn leads the college for the fulfillment of its stated mission. Feedback is facilitated by IQAC and Examination Committee every year for the staff who is better assessed by the Principal. The faculty members whose performance is below the desired minimum level of expectancy are counseled by the Principal. Continuous improvement in the academic process is ensured through Seminars & Conferences at the National or International level to update their knowledge & recent trends in higher education.

The College makes efforts to build a healthy relationship with its stakeholders especially students, parents, teachers & society through interaction with them.

Interaction with students is initiated through tutorials. Their suggestions are valued. Every teacher has about ten students. So they have friendly & cordial relations. They can express their views freely. Students have an easy access to the Principal to discuss their problems and get them solved.

The annual meet of old students Association gives an opportunity for the old students to be a part of the institution; Even after leaving the college they continue to contribute to the overall development of the institution through the provision of becoming lifetime members of the alumni.

The College considers its faculty as one of its strong pillars. Being aided & affiliated college, there are no transfers and staff is living like a family. All the sorrows and joys are shared. They share all the celebrations. They have a sense of belongingness. There are no professional grievances or grudges among the staff.

The Principal and Management value the opinion of the Public too. They make all the efforts to reach out to the public & interact with the public. Malerkotla being a small city, public has an easy access to the Management. Parents can approach the Managing Committee easily. Even the Managing Committee is also dedicated and they pay great heed to the parents & value their suggestions. Moreover the gentry of the city is invited to all the functions of the college. Media is also invited to its functions. Press plays a great & positive role in the

publicity of the events of the college. Results of Academics, Co-Curricular Activities and Games are highlighted by the press. So they also play a great role.

Participatory leadership is ensured at every level to promote the culture of excellence. A fair representation is given to all the faculties while constituting committees for various aspects of the functioning of the College.

Changes in the existing rules & regulations are brought about after thorough discussion with the staff as per the needs of present generation. At the end of the annual examination, the Principal discusses with the heads of the different departments about the proposed workload, needs of the students and any other changes, they would like to have. So new staff is deputed to meet the needs of the students.

6.1.4. What are the procedures adopted by the institution to monitor and evaluate policies and plans of the institution for effective implementation and improvement from time to time?

The college has a clear and well defined system to monitor and evaluate the effectiveness and effective implementation of the plans of the institution. The college ensures that the desired objectives are being achieved through the IQAC.

Various Committees have been established for smooth functioning of the college. These Committees are directed to prepare action plans & discuss it with the Principal. The Committee scan out the projects & submit the report to the Principal at the end of the year. Feedback is obtained from stakeholders.

The college is affiliated to the Punjabi University Patiala & getting 95% grant-in-aid from Punjab Government. So it has to obey the rules of Punjabi University, Patiala and Punjab Government through DPI (College) Pb. Financial Matters, approvals of the staff & many other matters are discussed with the DPI/university authorities. The committee members discuss the problems with the Principal. The role & responsibilities of the staff are communicated to the staff for effective functioning of the college. In the interest of the college, staff meetings are held. At the same time staff members are the members of board of studies or Faculty of languages. The Principal attends all the meetings of the University. The syllabus & other rules & regulations are followed. The same process is adopted for the implementation of plans & policies of the University.

Even the Management is all the time supportive to the Principal, staff & students. They extend every type of support.

6.1.6 How does the college groom leadership at various levels?

The supportive administration always encourages the involvement of the staff in the quality assurance. Various members are involved in developmental activities of the college such as Building Committee, Discipline committee, Admission Committee, Library Committee etc. All Committees are mixture of Senior & Junior members of the staff to imbibe the ethos and work culture of the college. The faculty members with potential are groomed for leadership roles by entrusting them with the responsibility of convenorship. So work culture is developed among the staff.

Training Programmes:- The Principal, administrative staff are encouraged to attend leadership training programmes. Faculty members are deputed by the Principal to attend National or International Seminars.

Student Leadership: - Students are taught leadership qualities through N.S.S. programmes. Students are given free responsibility to different works in the camp. They are supported to perform the responsibilities and take some decisions. All the cooking for approx. 100 persons is done by the students. They are given stage confidence also. Red Cross, Red Ribbon club & Legal Literacy club also give leadership qualities to the students. All this leads to overall personality development of the students.

6.1.7. How does the college delegate authority and provide operational autonomy to the departments/units of the institution and work towards decentralized governance system?

The college authorities are sensitized to managerial concept of de-centralization. Moreover running an institution is a team work. So the work is divided among different committees for the smooth running of the institution. Madam Principal discusses with the Vice Principal, Head of Departments and various Committees before putting any agenda before the managing committee. It creates an environment of democracy and everyone feels equally important. Moreover best comes from every side. Hence administrative powers and responsibilities are delegated to the staff members on the basis of their competence, commitment and aptitude to meet the institutional objectives, which are stated below:

- It creates positive and motivating forces.
- It cultivates team spirit to speed up target achievement.
- Initiation spirit is aroused among the staff.
- It makes task more interesting and work a rewarding experience.

The conveners of different committees plan & monitor the projects. Ultimately all the work is reviewed by the worthy Principal along with the vice Principal. This decentralization of

powers is based on the mission and vision of the College and is guiding & motivating force for the staff as well as the institution.

The college is governed by the DPI (Colleges) Punjab as well as Punjabi University Patiala. The DPI(colleges) governs the financial problems regarding the aided staff as well as schemes of the state as well as center government.

All the policies are circulated to the Principal and are executed through her. All the Government decisions are conveyed either through mail or correspondence or personal meetings with the Principal.

Academic policies are governed by the Punjabi University Patiala. Madam Principal is a member of Academic Council. Each staff member remains members of board of studies as well as faculty of languages for two years by rotation. Worthy Principal as well as staff members attend the meetings & express their views. Last year Dr. Baljeet Kaur, Department of Sanskrit prepared syllabus for B.A.I, II in Sanskrit. Mr. Puneet Sapra, Asstt. Prof. in comp. Sci. as a Member of Committee, was instrumental in bringing some positive change in the syllabus of BCA I.

At Management level two staff representatives are there. They convey the problems of staff & students to the Management.

So everywhere participatory, leadership and team work culture prevails, emblematic of the values & ethos of the college enable the College community to internalize these and in turn create institutional loyalty and the willingness to walk an extra mile.

The Principal analyses the students' reflections and shares it individually.

Institution aliasing quality assurance strategies and process through IQAC. It has been actively functioning in the college since Jan 26, 2014 with the thrust on academic and administrative excellence. 7.2 INNOVATIONS

The college has introduced several improvements at academic, administrative and other levels. The college is functioning to foster global competencies among students and enable them to carve a niche for themselves in this fast changing educational scenario.

- New M.Com. PG course has been introduced.

- White Boards have replaced Black Boards.
- Wi-Fi facility provided in Computer Lab as well as Administrative office.

Financial help for students: The College provides fee concession to meritorious and needy students. At the time of admission, applications from the needy students are scrutinized and such students are provided maximum concession or full fee is paid by some philanthropic

person in some cases. In order to ensure access to education to all girls, the College has fixed affordable fee which is further divided in installments to reduce financial burden on students.

Extra classes for weak students: Students weak in studies are provided extra classes. They are always encouraged to take help from their teachers in free period which may prove to be final push for such students to brush up their lessons and to enable them to do well in examinations.

Efforts for overall development of students: The College constantly makes efforts for the overall development of students. The college collects data about students progression and identifies achievement gaps among student groups. The parents of non-performers are contacted, and advised to pay extra heed to such wards. The college regularly evaluates its academic programmes and services to determine how well they promote student success and how they can be improved. College establishes an educational environment where all students have the best opportunities to succeed. A commitment to equity ensures that institution provides best possible education in limited resources, especially to those who have traditionally faced many barriers to achievement.

Fastening global competencies: It involves communication skills, interpersonal skills, leadership qualities for which the facility of Language Lab is provided. Functions and co-curricular activities are held from time to time and many outreach programmes like N.S.S., Red Ribbon Club, Red Cross etc. are there in the College to enable students to acquire leadership qualities.

Labs and LCD Projectors: The College has various well equipped labs to enhance professional competency of the students. LCD Projector is installed in Seminar hall. Presentation made on LCD projector help the students to grasp the concepts in a better way and effectively. The use of projector makes the learning more convenient and impressive.

Proctor Duties: The College assigns Proctor duties to the members of the faculty. Teachers are assigned the duty to maintain the discipline in the College campus, to ensure that students do not miss classes, and to see that College is kept neat and clean. No student is allowed to litter the campus with garbage.

Feedback: Suggestion/complaint boxes are put in College campus. Students can give their views regarding teaching, curriculum and infrastructure. Required action is taken accordingly. The identity of the students is not disclosed. Tutorial groups are another way of getting feedback from the students.

Internal Assessment: Internal assessment is mainly based on class attendance, performance and mid semester test. 25 % internal assessment with a little variation in some

Subjects/Courses as per University rules is provided. Internal assessment is very transparent, which is based on the students' capabilities, their performance, marks scored in the internal house exams.

Educational Tour: The College organizes Educational Tour to various places like Historical places, or places of educational Religions relevance to give the students exposure and acquaint them with the rich culture and history of our country.

7.3 BEST PRACTICES

7.3.1 Elaborate any two best practices which have contribute to the achievement of the institutional objective or contributed to the quality improvement of the core activity of the college.

1. **At the service of students** :- The institution has its own limitations of different kinds. It is situated in the heart of the town in a very congested and limited area. So keeping in view the difficulties of the rural students, we have to use vans instead of buses and transportation generally remains under loss. Despite the limited resources and financial constraints the Management of the college has to face, the students are provided the best educational facilities whatever can be possibly provided. The college has a well qualified and experienced staff of 35 teachers. 11 posts are the sanctioned posts and we get grant in aid only for the 06 posts. The other 05 vacant posts are being filled and paid from the Management account coffer. 03 non teaching aided posts are also filled up and paid by the Management.

Keeping in mind the best interests of the students, 23 teachers out of 35 are serving the institution on regular basis in 2015-16 as compared to 2014-15 which were 20.

Keeping in view the need and demand of the time, and also the educational need of the students, the following new courses have been introduced in the college. They are BCA, B.Com. PGDCA, M.Sc. (IT), M.Sc. (IT) Lateral Entry, MA Punjabi, MA Hindi, MA English and M.Com.

Taking into consideration its financial constraints and for running well all above mentioned courses, the college management has to struggle for tapping new financial resources and they have to even approach the various wealthy people of the town for seeking financial help from them. But the interest of the students is never allowed to suffer due to these financial constraints and their interest is always kept uppermost for their smooth sailing. The students are also provided free books from the library for their reading, and they are allowed to keep these books even during the course of examination without depositing them at the time of taking their university roll numbers for the

examination. Students are accommodated at every step. They are provided full support by the Principal as well as teachers at all levels: Economic, Academic, Psycho-Socio or any other kind. In other words we are always at the service of students.

2. **Communal Harmony:** - Malerkotla is a small town richly inhabited by the Muslim community where the parents generally do not like to send their daughters to the co educational institution. So keeping in mind the dire need of the people of this town, this girls institution provides its educational services to them. Almost 60 % population of the town belongs to Muslim community and most of the Muslim girls enjoy this education facility in their home town. A perfect communal harmony prevails in the town and in this institution as well. Despite the fact that the institution is being run by the Jain community, the students are never made to feel any difference of caste and creed. All girls live and work together for arranging different facilities in the college with the sense of communal good will and harmony. Almost all the festivals belonging to difference religion are celebrated in the college by the girls working together. No communal considerations are taken in to mind while selecting the staff for running the college. Only the merit with high qualification is made the criteria of selection so that the students may get quality education. Almost staff members from all communities are working in the college with good will and perfect communal harmony. There is no split of any kind among the staff and all are cooperative and helpful to one another, and particularly to the students. Even one day educational tours are arranged for keeping the interest of the students, and generally the college hires buses from outside for this purpose.
3. More so, even the different social organizations working in the town and the festive activities concerning local administration make this institution their venue and motivate the students for playing active role in the social and administrative activities of the town being its good social inhabitants.

SWOC ANALYSIS OF COMPUTER SCIENCE

S→As technology develops in leaps and bounds, the opportunities for expanding the field of computing grow even more rapidly. Computers have become a ubiquitous part of modern life, and

new applications are introduced every day. The strength of our department is that we have dedicated staff members. They personally take care of students and try to solve their problems so that they can focus effectively on their studies. In our department, there is transparency in academic and administrative process. We have adequate modern teaching aids. The focus is on the computer system designed as an element within a computer network, as well as Networking Technology. We have four computer labs with latest configuration computers, and there is networking in all the four labs.

W→In the world of competition, our students should be best in field like Technology and Communication but in spite of our efforts, we are not that much able to groom the student in both areas. There is no time to train students beyond academics because of huge amount of syllabus. There is no industry exposure to students .they are not familiar with industry. There are very few faculty development programs, less number of International Conferences, seminars, refresher courses .There is lack of interactive teaching methods, there is no project based training and no research work is done. There is lack of funded projects from government.

O→Opportunity to learn and teach new Technologies like Cloud computing, Ethical hacking and Android Applications. The career opportunities for computer science graduates can develop web sites, graphics and multimedia. Also they can work as systems analysts, database administrators, computer programmers and software developers and software testers .Also they have wide scope in telecommunications and networking, computer science *research*, web and Internet and medicine and health care.

C→To complete the syllabus in short period of time with complete understanding and encouraging students. There is big challenge for students to compete with students of other institutes .The computer subject is a practical subject, whatever you have studied, you have to learn, how to apply in your daily life. As you introduced yourself as computer expert at any public place (like conferences), if any problem occurs in the computer, then you must be competent enough to handle the problem. A challenge for department is to conduct workshops, make some industry visits. Assign some project works to students and help the students so that they must get completed in time. Some inter active methods to be used to make the study easier, interesting and full of knowledge.

Future Plans →

The Department aims to keep pace with the emerging Technology by organizing National Seminars/ Conferences. Workshops in recent developments in our subject, also by strengthening the library by procuring more Computer Text Books, Computer and IT Journals and Computer Reference Books. Even in many competitive exams, remarkable portion of questions are related to the current affairs of economy. So economics as a subject helps students for making their base strong for appearing in such competitive exams.

C → "To impart among students the basics of fundamentals of economics and to encourage them to understand practical aspects of this theoretical subject is biggest challenge in front of Asstt. Prof. The challenge is to make the subject interesting and make a better understanding of the theories and relevant concepts.

SWOC ANALYSIS OF HOME SCIENCE

S → Strength is feeling of achievement after completion of syllabus (theory and practical) in all three degree classes. The knowledge of this subject gives confidence that students are in a position to

handle various aspects of home making like resource management, budget, cutting and stitching of garments, taking care of sick patients, making flower arrangements, doing beautiful Rangoli on various auspicious occasions. The eagerness of students to learn, good response in class, good feedback from them boosts energy level to provide my best to students in given time.

W → Weakness is in this context in preparing practical files, students present good picture but actually they might have taken help from others. Students who feel stitching of garment is difficult considered it to be a tough subject. The practical's are very lengthy and consume lot of time.

O → Our subject offers tremendous opportunities to students. Besides making them competent future homemakers, various fields of home science provide employment opportunities to aspiring students. They can start their own cookery classes, offer packed tiffin services, sell home baked fresh cakes, run boutiques, sell beautifully embroidered articles, tie and dye articles, open baby crèches, work as decorators for various functions. After completing PG diploma or masters degree, they can get job as dietician in hospitals, fashion designers, work as lecturers in colleges and provide extension education services.

C → Challenges in subject are related to teaching average students to be able to perform practical well. In B.A. 1st, it's a challenge to teach Rangoli art and flower arrangement to students who lack creativity or are not so good in drawing. In B.A. 2nd, needle work and drafting needs patience and practice. In B.A. 3rd it's a challenge to prepare good recipes in class, organize students to work in groups. Students should not under estimate value and importance of this subject.

Future Plans

1. Food Festivals: we can organize food festivals where students can put various stalls of recipes at reasonable prices.
2. Exhibition: exhibition of prepared samples of embroidery, tie and dye, stitched garments can be held which will encourage students.

After studying 158 constitutions of different countries, Aristotle regarded political science as the "supreme Science" or the "masters of all social sciences". Political science is very useful to broaden our outlook and widen ones intellectual horizon, because the whole world has become a small family due to the advancement of mass-communication and inter dependence. Politics covers all the political and non-political factors which influence our life directly or indirectly. The study of political science is essential in modern democratic countries. It is rightly said, "External vigilance is the price of liberty". Man learns how to co-operate and adjust himself with his fellow beings. In spite of the study of state government, and different constitutions, the principles of liberty equality and fraternity are made clear. The subject matter of political science is very wide.
